Meet the ACCCN Board Malcolm Green, ACCCN National Vice President & NSW/ACT National Representative



Malcolm started working in Intensive Care in the late 1990's and joined ACCCN as part of his professional development whilst studying for a Master of Nursing (Critical Care). Supported by inspiring nurse mentors, Malcolm had the opportunity to attend and present at the ANZICS/ACCCN Annual Scientific Meetings (ASM) and enjoyed the learning almost as much as the social events!

Malcolm successfully nominated to join the ACCCN NSW/ACT Branch in 2015 and now works with an amazing group of passionate critical care nurses to advocate for our fellow members. After trying his hand at various branch roles, he took on the responsibility of National Representative. Malcolm was elected to the ACCCN Board of Directors in 2017 and has worked

alongside Alison Hodak as the National Vice President since 2019.

Malcolm's day job is with the NSW Clinical Excellence Commission as Principal Lead, Patient Safety Improvement Programs. In this role he is responsible for state wide initiatives to improve the early recognition and response to deteriorating patients, sepsis management and the prevention of harm from falls and pressure injuries in the NSW Public Health System.

His seemingly conflicting interests of resuscitation and organ donation have seen him work for both the Australian Resuscitation Council and the NSW Organ and Tissue Donation Service. Malcolm undertook the Institute for Healthcare Improvement year-long Improvement Advisor Program, graduating in September 2017, and he continues to teach Quality Improvement Science at a local and national level.

ACCCN End-of-Life Advisory Panel Webinar – 'A National Position Statement on Adult End-of-Life Care in Critical Care'



The provision of end-of-life care is a core feature of critical care nursing. For this reason, ACCCN supported the development of a position statement to provide nurses with clear practice recommendations to guide the provision of end-of-life care, and which reflect the most relevant evidence and information associated with end-of-life care for adult patients in Australian critical care settings.

Associate Professor Melissa Bloomer and Dr Kristen Ranse will host this webinar and provide an overview of:

- the research methodology and outcomes of the literature review used to inform the position statement; and
- practice recommendations developed from the literature

The position statement is intended to provide practical guidance to critical care nurses in the provision of adult end-of-life care in Australian critical care settings.

During the webinar, participants will be encouraged to ask questions and the Advisory Panel hope participants use this webinar not only as an opportunity to contribute to their professional development, but to also guide and inform their clinical practice.

WA Deteriorating Cardiac Patient Study Day - 'A Change of Heart'



The day examines acquired and congenital cardiac disease in both the paediatric and adult cardiac patient, which can sometimes lead to the need for 'A Change of Heart', especially for the acutely unwell and deteriorating cardiac patient.

Participants will be introduced to the latest research around caring for 'dead' hearts, and the recognised need to maintain viability of the heart in readiness for transplant. They will also hear a very personal recounting of a heart transplant recipient's experience, as well as be presented with incredible case studies from both the adult and paediatric streams. The heart-warming story of being a parent of a child with a cardiac condition will be presented in the paediatric stream.

Participants will be able to move between the two streams according to their preference, as both the adult and the paediatric streams will be running concurrently throughout the day.
